Karen Wirth and her husband Kenny had been active Long Island ABATE members for 6 years. If you were a new member attending a meeting or event for the first time it was probably Karen who was welcoming you to the family. She always went out of her way to make everyone feel welcome and included. Karen served on the committee that assisted with the disbursement of checks raised through the yearly Veterans Appreciation Run. Another one of Karen's projects was coming up with the idea and producing the Look For Motorcycle books to encourage young children to look for motorcycles while in the car with their family. Inside the booklets they could write down the manufacturer and color of the bike as well as if it had one rider or two. Her thought was that if we can teach young children to see motorcycles on

the road while they are passengers in vehicles then they would in turn be more aware of bikes on the road as drivers.

Karen was also a member of the Patriot Guard Riders for over eleven years. She along with her husband

Kenny stood more missions than anyone could count. They were part of the group often referred to as the "Usual Suspects". It didn't matter the weather you could always count on Karen and Kenny to be there to honor that Veteran, often a half an hour before the mission required you to be there because in Kenny's mind a half an hour early is ON TIME. I remember attending my first Patriot Guard mission unsure if I was even going to stay and return for another mission as I did not know anyone nor did I ride a motorcycle which is not a requirement however the majority of members ride. Sitting at a table having lunch with my children Karen and Kenny walked over to us and introduced themselves asking



why are we seated alone? I responded by saying I didn't know anyone here and with that they both introduced themselves and asked if they could join us. From that day forward a friendship was formed. A few years into Karen's time with the PGR she was named a Ride Captain. Karen's main responsibility was the Welcome Homes at Macarthur Airport for our service men and woman returning from deployments. As we stood for less and less welcome homes as the troops deployed became less in numbers Karen would Ride Captain other Patriot Guard missions as well. Karen was old school. She had no problem pointing out to you if you were not acting in a professional manner. That flag line is the most recognized symbol of the Patriot Guard and she ensured it was ship shape. She also enjoyed our monthly HOTH (Help On The Home front) visits to the Northport VA where we would spend a couple hours with the Veteran's residing there and play some bingo and celebrate whosever birthday it was that month.

Karen's work honoring Veterans was not just limited to her Patriot Guard missions. She had made up these cards similar to a business card. Cards were double sided on one side was our American Flag and on the other it said Thank You for Your Service. She carried these cards everywhere she went. If she would see a man or woman wearing a hat or another form of clothing indicating they were a Veteran she'd approach them, thank them for their service and hand them one of the cards she made up. Many of times we were out at lunch and while eating she'd see a Veteran enter or already seated and stop eating her meal, get up and walk over and hand them a card and say thank you.

Karen and Kenny were like everyone's role model. If you followed their example you were a better person for it. They loved and supported you unconditionally. If you ever needed anything you could count on them to be there. Karen also gave the best hugs. If you have ever been hugged by Karen as I'm sure many of you have you know exactly what I mean. In closing I ask you to do me one favor. If you are ever out and about and you see a total stranger who is a Veteran, please stop what you are doing and approach that person and say thank you. I know if you do Karen will be up there in heaven smiling from ear to ear and her legacy will live on. I will miss you Karen Wirth however I take solace in the fact that you are reunited with your soul mate Kenny in Heaven riding free

Wearable Air Bags Save Lives




Car <u>air bags</u> have proven their usefulness time and time again. From 1987 to 2015, frontal <u>air bags saved</u>

nearly 45,00 lives in the United States, according to statistics from the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA). They work by inflating within less than 1/20th of a second when a car is involved in a moderate to severe crash. They're designed to work with your seatbelt to reduce the chances that you will hit your head or upper body during the crash.

But what if you're riding, say, a motorcycle? Or even a horse? Well there are actually wearable air bags designed to protect you, as well. We'll explain. It's no secret that motorcycle accidents are often fatal. The NHTSA National Center for Statistics and Analysis 2016 report determined that a motorcyclist is 28 times more likely to die in road accident than a passenger in a car. Many motorcyclists do protect themselves with helmets and heavy leather clothing that's fitted with impact-resistant plates. But personal air bags in jackets or vests may prove to be a safe and comfortable alternative. Helite, a French company founded in 2002, is one of the oldest developers of personal air bag technology for bicyclists and motorcyclists, equestrians, skiers, pilots and senior citizens.

The <u>Helite Airbag system</u> for motorcyclists uses a lanyard attached to both the motorcycle and vest. If the lanyard disengages from the motorcycle, it releases a pin and the air bag inflates in less than 1/10th of a second — and stays inflated for 15 to 20 more seconds to protect a rider during a crash. The <u>equestrian airbag works similarly</u>. Riders attach the lanyard to their saddle stirrup strap. If the rider falls or is thrown, the lanyard disengages the pin and inflates the air bag. Several other companies, including U.S.-based <u>Skidbike</u>, offer personal air bags using this same type of approach.

However, Helite has another personal air bag specifically made for cyclists that uses a different technology. Helite's B'Safe cycling vest uses sensors in both a wearable vest and also mounted under the bicycle's seat to analyze the cyclist's motion and shocks. When they detect something abnormal, they "communicate" and assess the situation. If they sense an accident or fall, they trigger the vest to inflate. In February 2019, B'Safe won the 2019 French Innovation Award for Road Safety Innovation in the two wheels assistance category



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SMART WINDSHIELD

Samsung revealed a new technology that would add a smart-phone-connected display to a motorcycle's windscreen. Samsung worked with <u>Yamaha</u> on a prototype of its new Smart Windshield, applying the technology on a **Tricity** three-wheeled scooter.

The Smart Windshield shows information on a screen built into the shield itself. The screen is transparent and located low on the shield so it doesn't obscure the rider's vision. The screen connects to a smartphone via WiFi. An app on the phone relays information to the screen, showing GPS navigation directs, email and messaging notifications and incoming calls. The app can also automatically send a text reply to incoming calls, telling the caller you're on the road and can't answer the phone

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


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NIGHT RIDERS

Let's get this off the table to start with - we will not be talking about David Hasselhoff, sorry if you happen to be a fan. In fact we are going to take a look at the dark side of riding, without any discussion about the force; we'll be reviewing riding at night. OK I'll try to keep Star Wars out of this too.

Seems there may be just as many riders that have a bit of fear to night riding compare to those that try to avoid riding in the rain. As with everything else, a



The first and foremost reason for any hazard associated with riding at night - it's dark. With the loss of light there is obviously a reduction visual capability; not only for you, but those sharing the road. Even before you get started, consider how well your night vision really is. Some things that happened as we get older includes reduction of vision in general, which in turn affects your night vision. Some folks experience extended "starring" from other vehicle headlights, combine that with possible delayed reaction time for the vision issue and it can turn out to be something unexpected and unwanted. If your night vision is minimal, then planning around not riding in the dark may be a better option; but if you do there are options to be safer.

These days the abundance of high tech LED primary and auxiliary lighting for both front and rear can be a major benefit for visual recognition, again for both you and others. Certainly cost may be a factor for some, especially if riding at night is not part of one's normal road activity; but that cost could be a big saver for your own well being or property (aka - your motorcycle). OK, spending a ton of dough may not work for you; yet fear not, you do have alternatives to help protect yourself.

When rolling with the night crickets, consider wearing high reflective gear or a vest, even bright colored gear; black certainly has no noticeable value in the dark. There are even options for reflective tape that can be place strategically on your bike or helmet to make you more visible to others. With the overall thought process or strategy to riding that includes to SEE (Search Evaluate Execute) and be seen, doing whatever we can at night will do good to us overall. Use whatever available lighting around you that you can, if you are riding in city conditions, try to avoid darker streets. If in rural areas, use the lighting of other vehicles when available to give you more visual clues. Even a cars taillights can help you. If you are following a vehicle and see the rear lights go up and down it could be indicating a dip, pothole or some other road hazard ahead.

Try to know your riding area; looking for turn offs, street names, etc in an unfamiliar place can interject some distracted measures. Being mentally sidetracked while dealing with the risks with riding at night can result in a bad combination. Along with hazards of road conditions, other vehicles or traffic; depending on your location, wildlife can also add to the risk factor. Many animals are nocturnal and can come apparent in your headlights way too quickly. With that though, do no override your headlights. That means - watch you speed. For instance, if your headlight shines 100' ahead of you, but the speed your traveling winds up needing 150' to stop because of your perception (available vision), reaction time and braking distance; that little Bambi that suddenly shows up in the light can become a big problem for you and your bike. Simple step to take into account when riding at night - slow down. This thought works well during the day too.

So we only touched on a few issues that comes with riding in the wave of darkness, but it doesn't have to be a bad thing. Respect the issues that can cause harm and adjust for them. Do everything to see as much as you can; whether it be additional lighting, use of any lighting around you, even having your vision checked to be sure you are seeing what you can clearly. At the same time, do what you can for others to see you the best they can. Driver's first response when involved in a crash with a motorcyclist is "I didn't see him/her" adding a cloak of darkness definitely does not make things better.

Yes riding at night positively has its added level of risks, but at times can be enjoyable. Do not let your fear of it get the best of you and if you do venture out into the dark side; may the force be with you. Sorry about that, fell into my own corny trap - Be Safe Out There!

Leaders of State Motorcyclists' Rights Organizations (SMROs), they wanted to catapult to the national scene the clout and effectiveness of SMROs — the strong, effective grassroots of state-based motorcyclists' rights.

They knew it had to be done. Riders' rights had to go national, because the threat was national. Our founders at this meeting of the minds shared a keen sense that danger was not just on the horizon but dead ahead, as freedom's foes had just attacked with a ban on motorcycles in the United States Congress.

They knew it had to be done right. The founders wanted a staff that was all muscle and no fat, supported not by casual members but driven by a team of dedicated volunteers, with each volunteer committed to shouldering his or her share of the demands of liberty. They envisioned a team committed to core values like respect for riders' diverse lifestyles and opinions, integrity in conduct, excellence and boldness in facing challenges head-on and, above all, leadership — leadership in the unrelenting struggle for the safety and freedom of American motorcyclists.

So, at a meeting of the minds of grassroots leaders, a new leader was born: The Motorcycle Riders Foundation. The first motorcyclists' rights advocacy organization with a full-time legislative and political presence in our nation's capital. The only Washington voice devoted exclusively to you, the street rider. And each year, the leaders of the nowworldwide community gather for motorcycling's premier political leadership summit — named to commemorate the gathering at which we were founded: The MRF Meeting of the Minds.

Throughout the USA and across the world, the torch of freedom burns in the hearts of motorcyclists. One by one, they recognize the need to become volunteers as co-partners in an organization committed to integrity, respect, leadership, teamwork and excellence.

One by one, in every continent and culture, motorcyclists are deciding to Ride with the Leaders $^{\rm TM}$.

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

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
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

What Coverage Do You Need?

Your motorcycle coverage needs will be based on a combination of your state's insurance laws and your own personal situation. While getting the minimum coverage needed to meet your state's legal definition of being insured is an obvious must, you will most likely be better off getting more, so that you truly safeguard yourself financially in case of an accident. Though the different levels of coverage are very similar to car insurance, there key differences to keep in mind when choosing a motorcycle insurance policy:

Liability Insurance:

Most states determine who pays for damages from an accident based on fault. In these states, liability coverage is required. It is what provides coverage for the other party in the event that you are at fault in an accident. Liability includes bodily injury liability, to pay for the other party's medical expenses, and property liability, to pay for any damage to their vehicle. Unique to motorcycle insurance, some companies also offer guest passenger liability coverage, to cover your passenger if they are injured.

While liability is generally the legal minimum for insurance, it is always a good idea to consider further protection. The reason is that motorcycles are considered high-risk vehicles, and any accident is likely to cost much more than liability coverage will pay.

Personal Injury Protection (PIP):

PIP pays towards medical care for you, your passenger, or pedestrians in the event of an accident. You may be familiar with PIP if you have car insurance and especially if you live in a no-fault state, or those where your own insurance pays for damages no matter who is at fault. With motorcycle insurance, however, PIP is not required coverage. Since the risk of injury in general is higher, many states do not allow PIP to be sold to motorcyclists.

Collision Insurance:

Motorcycle collision insurance is meant to cover repairs to your bike in the event of a collision. How much you'll get reimbursed for depends on the damages caused, the value of your bike, and the policy you have.

Comprehensive Insurance:

Comprehensive insurance covers bike damage caused by circumstances other than the typical traffic accident -- including inclement weather, theft, and animal collision.

Uninsured/Underinsured Motorist (UM/UIM) Insurance:

UM/UIM insurance pays for damages caused by an accident with a rider who is either uninsured or underinsured. This generally covers medical treatment and property damage, but of course depends on the provider.

The coverage you opt for will depend on your own riding situation and personal concerns, but it is generally a good idea to have a better policy than the legal minimum. Not only are motorcycles higher risk than the average car, but accidents tend to cost far more than what basic liability can cover. Keeping yourself safe, both physically and financially, is the priority
